## From the Headteacher

Dear Parent/Carer

Welcome to our March Newsletter.

It has been a very productive term despite the challenges we face as a city.

Easter is such an important time of year, as Christians remember the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ and all that it means. ### Year 7-9 Prayer Morning

We had a KS3 prayer morning on Monday 25 March and it was great to see so many students involved. We are grateful to all the students who participated and to Chaplain Josh for his leadership.

### **ALIVE Points**

This week I have had the pleasure of celebrating with 62 students who have achieved at least 250 ALIVE Points this academic year. It was great to recognise them for all they do and are. I will be writing to all the students and look forward to celebrating with the next cohort later this year. Well done!

### Attendance

Thank you and our students for your support and resilience in ensuring students attend school as regularly as possible. Despite areas for development, we continue to have absence rates lower than the local and national average. We recently received national recognition for the levels of attendance at SMRT. ### Uniform

As we prepare for a two-week break, I would like to firstly thank all students who wear the school uniform with pride. This is a basic expectation, but nonetheless, it makes such a difference to the sense of community and belonging.

We know there are barriers for some families in terms of access to uniform. We have effective processes in place to help overcome these barriers and we therefore expect our students to wear the correct uniform in line with our Behaviour and Good Relationships Policy. <u>Here</u> is a link to our uniform page. We will notify parents, carers, and students when we move to the summer uniform, but in the meantime, we ask for your support as we enforce the expectation of the correct uniform being worn appropriately throughout the school day. If you need any support, please contact your child's tutor as the first port of call. We are in

discussions with our uniform provider regarding uniform costs. These discussions will gather pace now that we have our new School Business Manager in post.

### Governor of Bank of England Visit

We had the privilege of hosting the Governor of the Bank of England at SMRT on Tuesday 26 March, and he met with our A Level Economics student and some Y11 students who are hoping to study Economics in Y12 next year. We also welcomed staff and students from other Bristol Schools. Andrew Bailey shared that they were the best questions he had ever taken from a school group. We are very grateful to Andrew for being so informative, engaging, and approachable.

### **Neurodiversity Celebration Week**

Neurodiversity Celebration week took place during 18 to 22 March. ### Banana Bridge News

Bristol City Council will be starting the restoration of Langton Street Bridge in May as part of a wider programme of repairs. Langton Street Bridge, also known as The Banana Bridge, will be closing on 13 May 2024 for a complete refurbishment of the structure. It will remain closed throughout the project, which is anticipated to take up to 18 months.

The iron and steel footbridge is a Grade II listed structure that was built in 1883. It spans the New Cut of the River Avon between Bedminster Bridge and Bath Bridge, providing a useful pedestrian link between the north and south of the river.

While it is closed, signposted diversions will direct people either on a route via Bath Bridge on Bath Road or via Bedminster Bridge. Students will need to factor the diversion into their journey into school and leave enough time for this diversion.

## **The School Nursing Service**

The School Nursing Service is made up of specialist school nurses, school nurses, school health assistants and administrators. School Nurses work for the NHS and are not employed by schools. Parents and professionals can make referrals into the School Nursing Service and we can provide more information on this for any parent or carer who is interested.

Our allocated School Health Nurse is Elly Blackmore. She comes into school every Monday and offers a drop-in service at lunchtime, in Chaplain Josh's room on C floor in the main building. Any student is welcome to drop in to see her at any point throughout lunchtime. Any information shared by students with Elly will always be treated as confidential, unless this information indicates that there is a risk of harm to the student or a third party, in which case Elly will always explain to the young person who she needs to talk to and what might happen next.

Elly can support students with:

- Emotions and worry management
- Continence needs
- · Sexual health and healthy relationship advice, including the C Card scheme
- · Healthy lifestyles advice
- Talking to school and parents about students' worries
- Health questions
- Stopping smoking
- Drugs and alcohol advice
- Feeling unsafe

The C Card scheme

The C Card scheme is aimed at young people between 13 and 24 years old, who can register to get a range of free condoms, information and advice. The aim of the service is to promote reproductive and sexual health and help young people to access local services.

The scheme is open to all young people. Condoms could be given to students over the age of 13 after lots of exploratory conversations with the School Nurse about safety, risks, healthy relationships and exploring ways of showing love without sex, if the nurse felt that the young person was going to participate in sex anyway. The nurse is bound by law to share information with the Designated Safeguarding Lead about any student under the age of 13 who asks for condoms. All students that want to participate in the C Card scheme are enrolled and have to participate in demonstrating the safe use and handling of condoms.

The School Nurse will also advise and signpost to other sexual health services if they are concerned about, for example, STIs, and can help the young people to make those appointments.

### **Gender identity**

While the School Nursing Service will provide advice and support around gender identity, where a student requests action from the school or college in relation to any degree of social transition, we will engage parents as a matter of priority, and encourage the student to speak to their parents.


