6	We value diversity and choice, we are interdependent	A unit that studies smaller world religions such as Jainism, Rastafari, Confucianism, Taoism, Shinto, Santería and pagan religions from around the world	This helps students to understand and appreciate people and religious traditions from a range of cultures and the influence they have on the wider world
