- October: Thursday 1<sup>st</sup> October School Deadline (this gives us time to check your application and add finalised your reference in time for the deadline)
- Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> October 6pm: Final UCAS deadline

#### Personal Statements – 4000 characters/47 lines

- How your qualities and skills match the course criteria
- Experiences in Healthcare/Medicine Work Experience (this can be virtual this year)
- Why you want to be a doctor! (not anything else)
- Communication skills
- Leadership
- Honesty and integrity
- Well rounded
- 80/20 Rule 80% academic/specific experience and 20% extra curricular
- Look at examples but don't be tempted to copy every personal statement will be checked for plagiarism

- BMAT or UCAT it is good to avoid doing both tests as this creates a lot of extra work
