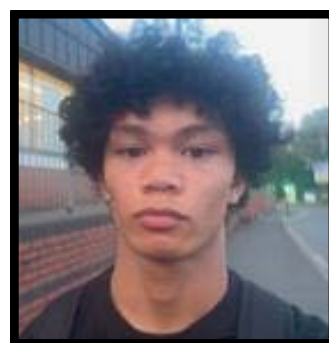

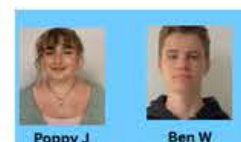

Volunteering in Year 13

Year 13s who are **NOT** undertaking an Extended Project Qualification (EPQ), Maths Studies, GCSE Maths, DofE or Super Curricular Study are expected to undertake Work Experience or Volunteering within the Community.

This will fulfill the requirements of being a Full Time Student.

This must be equivalent of at least **30 hours between October and the Easter holidays**, so averaging 1 hour per week.

Volunteering in Year 12

UNIFROG and WEX

- Unifrog is a one-stop-shop where students can easily explore their interests, then find and successfully apply for their next best step after school.
- Unifrog will help you to explore your key interests and what career paths you can take to reach your goals!

A reminder, all Year 12 students are expected to undertake Work Experience during WEX Week, which falls in July on one of the last weeks of Term 6! Students should begin researching and hunting down WEX as soon as possible. Remember, you have your tutor, Miss Kerby, your Head of Year and myself to support you - as well as all your subject teachers!

You will go through how to login to Unifrog during Tutor Time and in your VIP sessions! You will use UNIFROG to log your WEX placement - it is really important this is done!

Below I have added a very brief how to guide for logging any WEX, so you are able to refer to this when required!

You will be sent an email with a link to your school email address in due course. When recieved, click on the link and follow instructions for set up, any problems see your tutor! And a reminder to keep your password somewhere safe.

Keep an eye out for volunteering opportunities with Year 7 throughout the School year. These will be advertised via email and in the weekly newsletters.

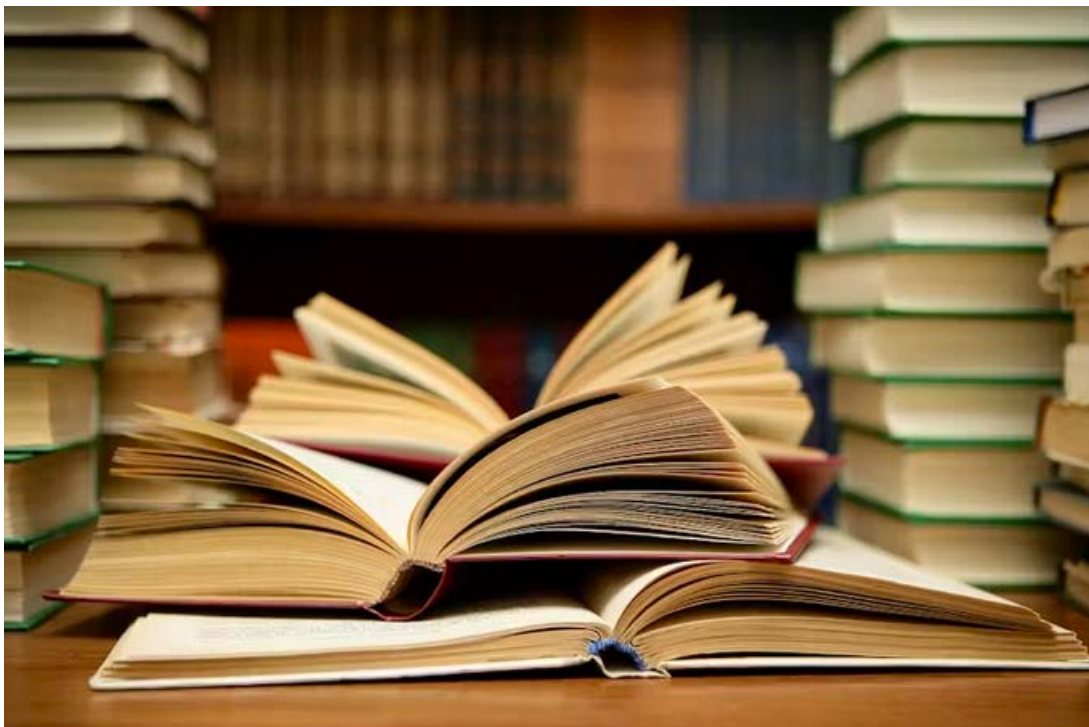

Music Department

Our Music Department, situated on B Floor in the main school, is a thriving and very friendly community which welcomes all instrumentalists and singers of any ability to join in our various activities.

Our department runs a wide variety of ensembles and choirs for students of all instruments and abilities, and often perform in concerts both locally and on music tours abroad, so why not come along and try out something new?

In addition, individual tuition for a musical instrument or singing can be organised!

Our choir and orchestra welcomes students of all ages and abilities to play fun repertoire, often arrangements by our own staff and students, and, with its rehearsals on Friday lunchtimes, is a lovely way to end the week. A chamber orchestra, for more advanced players, will play more challenging repertoire and will rehearse as necessary for specific events.

Advanced players are encouraged to also be involved in the main orchestra, but please get in touch if you are interested in playing in a smaller orchestral ensemble.

The choir rehearses once a week and performs in a variety of concerts, school Church services and other occasions, including joint-school concerts and music tours. For a more informal singing style, the gospel choir provides a fun and casual atmosphere for singing and also performs in school functions and their own concerts.

Morning instrument ensembles for flute, clarinet, saxophone and brass instrumentalists welcome all players of any ability, and are run by instrument teachers.

PE Volunteering Opportunities

Examples of PE Volunteering Opportunities include:

Support for individual students in PE Lessons- Many of our students struggle to cope with the performing and understanding of skills. Where appropriate and possible we would like to link a 6th form student with these students to work on a 1 to 1 basis or small group work

Team teaching alongside PE staff for a KS3 PE class- Develop your teaching skills by working alongside the teachers in KS3 PE lessons. You will develop your organisation and communication skills as you help deliver parts of the lesson.

Coach/Manager of a KS3 or KS4 extra-curricular team- Do you want to help coach/manage one of the KS3/KS4 sports teams? This would involve organising training sessions, Team Selection and publicity on noticeboards and school website.

Officiating Duties – House/school competitions- Are you a qualified official in any sport? Do you want to use your skills in the KS3 school and house fixtures? We will provide opportunities for you to use your skills and qualifications

Duke of Edinburgh Award

The D of E Gold Award programme is a certificated enrichment opportunity.

You achieve your Award by completing a personal programme of activities in five sections: Volunteering, Physical, Skills, Expedition and a Residential.

The first three of these require regular time commitments of differing lengths of time. We run the whole program in school and can support you in achieving the gold award within your time at SMRT 6th form, regardless of whether you have completed the bronze or silver award.

Access to Bristol

The Access to Bristol scheme is for local students taking A-levels, BTECs, Access to HE courses or equivalents.

Access to Bristol provides the following opportunities =

A unique way to experience what studying at the University of Bristol as a local student might be like.

A chance to discover more about a subject you are interested in from current university students and academic staff

A fantastic enrichment opportunity that will offer tailored information, advice and guidance to help students make an informed decision about higher education.

Successful completers of the scheme will be guaranteed a contextual offer or interview from Bristol, a top ten UK university (QS World University Rankings 2026).

Below are more details from their brochure which can also be found on their website, therefore there may be some amendments in the 2026-27 brochure.

WHAT IS ACCESS TO BRISTOL?



Aimed at local students studying A levels, and equivalents, Access to Bristol gives you a taste of student life at the University of Bristol.

Access to Bristol offers a range of subject streams, reflecting the variety of academic activity at the University. You will take part in academic taster sessions within your chosen subject, which will give you an idea of what it is like to study at Bristol.

As well as developing your subject knowledge in one of the subject streams offered, you will also be given the opportunity to take part in a study skills session and a general student life panel session to support your transition to higher education. You will be able to speak with current university students about their first-hand experience studying at the university, and go on a guided tour of our city centre campus.

BENEFITS OF ACCESS TO BRISTOL

What can Access to Bristol offer you?

- First-hand experience of what it is like to study at one of the UK's top ten universities.
- The opportunity to learn more about the subject you're interested in.
- The chance to meet local students who are interested in the same subject as you.
- A way to demonstrate your passion for a subject to universities and employers.

If you complete the Access to Bristol scheme, you will also have access to the following benefits.

If you are studying A levels:

For most courses, you will be guaranteed an offer at the contextual level, provided that you meet the full entry requirements of the course applied for. Students undertaking the appropriate subjects but not predicted the contextual offer will usually be made an aspirational offer.

Please note: we do not currently have a contextual version of BTEC entry requirements. This means that your offer will not be made any lower than stated.

If the course holds interviews as part of the selection process, you will be guaranteed an interview (for example, Medicine or Dentistry). The interview will only be guaranteed if your predicted grades meet the contextual entry requirements and you meet the GCSE subject requirements.

If you are studying Access to HE:

We encourage Access to HE learners who will be 21 or older on the first day of their undergraduate studies to apply to our new Mature Pathway to Bristol project, which offers more bespoke support, tailored information and guidance, additional flexibility, and opportunities to meet and



learners. Find out more by contacting mature-students@bristol.ac.uk.

If you are an Access to HE student who will be under the age of 21 when starting your undergraduate studies, you may still wish to apply to Access to Bristol. Access to HE students who complete Access to Bristol receive the same benefits as mature Access to HE students who complete the Mature Pathway to Bristol.

Please note: the Access to HE qualification is already at the contextual level, in recognition that students returning to study may face additional barriers to entering HE. This means that your offer will not be made any lower than stated.

For most courses, Access to HE students will be guaranteed an offer to study, providing full entry requirements are met. For some courses, including Medicine, Dentistry, and physics-intensive courses, Access to HE students will be guaranteed an interview instead, provided they are on track to meet the entry requirements of their chosen course(s).

HOW TO APPLY



How do I apply?

If you would like to take part in Access to Bristol, apply online between 1 September and 30 September 2025 at: bristol.ac.uk/access-to-bristol

We recommend that you discuss this scheme with the head of your sixth form or college before applying.

Access to Bristol is designed for students who have the grades, motivation and potential to succeed at a Russell Group university. The scheme is only open to students who meet all of the following criteria.

You must:

- be a Home fee student (see www.bristol.ac.uk/study/fee-status for further information);
- currently attending a state school or college;
- be resident in a BA, BS or other local postcode within an hour's journey of the University of Bristol (including South Wales);
- be in your first or second year of A Level study (or equivalent);
- have the academic ability to study at the University of Bristol (including meeting the GCSE entry requirements for your chosen course and studying any required Level 3 subjects). Applicants must have the potential to meet the contextual entry requirements for their chosen course.
- Applicants must have the potential to meet the contextual entry requirements for their chosen course.

The scheme is very popular and there is high demand for places. If a subject stream is oversubscribed, we will prioritise students who meet our widening participation criteria:

- are or have been eligible for free school meals;
- live in an IMD quintile 1 or 2 area as defined by your home postcode;
- are from a Black or Asian background or of a mixed background featuring one of these groups*;
- have spent three or more months in local authority care;
- are currently an estranged student;
- are from Gypsy, Traveller, Roma, Showmen and Boater (GTRSB) communities;
- attend an aspiring state school or college;
- are from any other minority ethnic background;
- are part of the first generation in their family to go to university;
- have caring responsibilities;
- have refugee status;
- have a disability;
- have a parent or carer who currently serves in the UK Armed Forces, or who has done so in the past.

*With additional priority assigned to the following underrepresented ethnic groups at UoB: Asian Pakistani; Asian Bangladeshi; Black Caribbean; Black African; or of a mixed backgrounds featuring one of these groups.

For the 2025/26 iteration of Access to Bristol, a Study Skills session will take place online at the start of each term. This session aims to support students with the soft skills needed to transition from level 3 study to higher education, and has been developed in

collaboration with the University's Study Skills team. As always, Access to Bristol participants will be expected to attend all sessions to successfully complete the scheme, including the online Study Skills session and five on-campus sessions.

Model UN simulates the General Assembly of the United Nations.

We tackle real world global issues by writing 'resolutions' to help solve the problem. These are submitted and then debated, with students arguing based on the ideology of the nations they represent.

Over the course of a term scenarios develop based on the policies enacted, requiring countries to adapt based on new information.

This results in high-quality and structured debate on issues ranging from those strongly grounded in reality such as Oil Crisis in the Middel East, to historic committees on the response to the Chernobyl disaster, to more 'out-there' issues such first as alien contact.

While the structure and language of a session may seem daunting at first, it's easy to get in to. As a club we're doing our best to make it as accessible as possible. Everyone in the club wants to see new members because new perspectives and ideas make MUN better. So, we're happy to help where possible!

There is no sign up required, just find us in the Common Room afterschool on a Thursday and we'll give you a country :)

At Model UN we debate real world geopolitical issues as the countries we represent.
