## What is higher education?


- The progression from school / college – freedom to choose what you study

#### Professional:

- Wide range of courses
- In-depth study
- New learning styles
- Careers service and support

#### Social:

- Meet lots of new people
- Gain independence
- Develop personal skills

- Volunteer
- Gain work experience

An investment in your future



Student finance

#### Tuition fees and loan

- Typically up to £9,250 per year
- Covers your learning and teaching, library access, course facilities etc.
- Student loan available
- Non-means tested

#### Maintenance loan

- Covers living costs
- Means tested, dependent on household income
- No repayments until you're earning over £27,295

#### What is UCAS?

- Main way to apply for fulltime university places in the UK
- Link between students and universities
- Over 3 million applications by 700,000 students processed every year by UCAS





#### **UCAS** timetable

September: application process opens

**15 October:** closing date for Oxbridge, Medicine, Dentistry, Veterinary Science


26 January: closing date for 'on-time' applications to other institutions/courses

Nov- May: offers/decisions by universities received through UCAS




## Your choices

Top tip: Give yourself plenty of time and don't be afraid to ask lots of questions




## Open Days



- Join clubs and societies 'give it a go'












## Clubs and societies

### Academic life


- Not a massive jump

- Work hard to get the grades needed!




