Choosing GCSE Options (for Year 9 Students)

After Christmas, Year 9 students will begin the process of selecting their GCSE option choices. This is a lengthy and detailed process, which will include ViP lessons on options, assemblies, information for parents and carers, additional support for key groups of students, and a dedicated section on our school website. We are currently finalising our curriculum offer for 2024 to 2025 and will begin to share information with students, and parents and carers towards the end of January with a view to finalising option choices in Term 5.

Sixth Form News

This is a busy time of the year for students from the Sixth Form Centre as we approach the UCAS deadline and our early entry students work hard to prepare for interviews. 17 of our students have been invited to interviews at Oxford and Cambridge and many others are starting to get offers from first choice universities. We are thankful to all external volunteers, including ex-teachers, parents/carers, and friends of friends, who give up their time to support with mock interviews, so that our students are well prepared. Several of our students are also involved in the Bristol Scholars programme run by the University of Bristol. As well as a guaranteed tailored offer, Bristol Scholars students take part in outreach activities, which include visits to the University and private academic tuition.

Our Sixth Formers have been contributing well to the school and wider community, with lots of our students helping Y7 with their reading, leading on main school assemblies with themes including Black History Month, and helping to prepare GSCE students for their exams. Lots of our students are also helping with a mentoring programme at Bridge Learning Campus, and are also involved in Envision, a social action programme.

Having won the Regional Competition run by the Space, Science, Engineering, and Environmental Foundation (<u>ssef.org.uk</u>), our Space Design Team consisting of Y12 and Y13 students, are now preparing for the National Competition in March.

Y12 and Y13 have planned several different fundraising events including cake sales, music events, and quizzes. We have already raised £1000 this year for various charities, but our two chosen RAG charities are Doctors Without Borders (MSF UK | Médecins Sans Frontières) which is an international humanitarian organisation providing medical care in more than 70 countries, and Aid Box Community, a Bristol-based humanitarian organisation who support refugees.

In school Y12 and Y13 have met with Brook, a sexual health and well-being charity, which included sessions on healthy relationships.


Design & Technology News

At the start of next Term, we will be opening the Nomination Period for three Parent Governor vacancies, as our current Parent Governors come to the end of their Terms of Office. Please consider prayerfully over the Christmas period whether you feel called to this important role within the school community.

Bristol Governor Development Service Guidance on being a governor at your child's school Parents are in a unique position on a governing body. Not only do they have to work in the best interests of the school, but they have to balance this with their natural desire to see the best outcomes for their own child(ren). The aim of this briefing paper is to offer advice to parents who are new governors and suggest ways of handling some of the tricky situations which may arise. As a parent and a governor it will sometimes feel that you have to know everything about the school, but can't talk about it; you have to be on everyone's side and you have to be able to juggle all these expectations. As a parent you will already be an expert juggler, but developing your role as a governor will take time. However, there is advice, help and support you can tap into and this guidance should provide some answers to questions you might have about your role. As a governor you are: well placed to understand parents' views and to remind the governing body how ٠ matters being discussed affect parents; individuals! How you vote on any decision is up to you; in a good position to help the governing body to communicate effectively with parents; equal in status to all other governors. Parents who are governors are not: expected to gather the views of other parents and take them to the governing body; simply expected to represent the interests of parents; a link between parents and the governing body; expected to vote as instructed by other parents. What are the good bits about being a governor? You have a very privileged and responsible role; You have the opportunity to make a difference, not only for your children, but for children in years to come: You have the opportunity to make a difference for other parents, and to influence the way in which school works with them; You will learn a lot and develop new skills. How to fulfil your role Attend governing body meetings regularly and play an active role in committees and decision-making: Learn all you can about the school; Attend training sessions: Consider how the governing body communicates with parents? Could you help the governing body to improve links? How accessible is the school - how easy is it for parents to go into school to discuss things with the headteacher or teachers? Could you give feedback to help the school to be more open and welcoming? How accessible are the governors - do parents ever get the opportunity to meet with governors; do they know how to get in touch with the chair of governors if they need to? Could you encourage the governing body to be more visible?

- Learn how the school handles complaints and read the complaints policy. If another
 parent approaches you with a complaint, advise them to speak to their child's class
 teacher or to headteacher;
- Be approachable to other parents, but make sure you are clear about your role.
- Always represent the school positively;
- As a governor you are one of a group and must never act alone;
- Always support the decisions of the full governing body. Have your say on decisions in meetings and vote in the way you wish; but then support the outcomes of votes – even if you disagree with them;
- Always, always, always observe confidentiality. You will get to know a lot of highly sensitive and confidential information – don't discuss it with anyone who is not a governor. Remember, a governor can be suspended for serious breaches of confidentiality.

How you can help individual parents

From time to time you may be approached by other parents asking for help, or wanting to make a complaint about something the school is, or isn't, doing.

- Make it clear you can't act for the governing body;
- Don't raise expectations that the school will "put it right" there may be underlying issues or background that you don't know about;
- Keep an open mind there are at least two sides to every story!
- You may need to explain why the governing body has made a decision in a certain way, so be prepared;
- Direct the parent to the appropriate person (usually their child's class teacher) in accordance with the school's procedure for handling complaints.

What to do if you experience a conflict between being a parent and being a governor

This can happen – especially if you think the governing body is making decisions which you feel will adversely affect your child(ren).

- If a difficulty arises, take a step back and think things through as objectively as you can;
- If you are concerned, talk to the headteacher or to the chair of governors;
- Make sure you don't break confidentiality when discussing your concerns outside governing body.

Where to get help, advice and support

- From other governors;
- From the headteacher;
- From the chair of governors;
- From the clerk to the governing body;
- · Ask for a governor mentor or "buddy" to help you through the first few months;
- Attend the induction training offered by the Local Authority. You'll meet other new governors and will find lots of people who feel just the same as you;
- Phone or e-mail the Governor Development Service (contact details below). They
 are a small, busy team so if you can't reach them straightaway, please leave a
 message and someone will call you back as soon as they can.
